I posted from my phone while I was walking to both NextDoor and the Williamsburg 2 site. In less than an hour, her dog had gotten to another neighborhood entirely and had been found! Wildlife and Williamsburg 2

The Quadra-Whats?

In our solar system, we have the opportunity to view and enjoy many cosmic objects and events. Some are predictable and annual, like the Geminids Meteor Shower, which makes a colorful appearance the second week of every December. Some are infrequent combinations of factors that come together, like during a Supermoon Eclipse; and very rarely, we get a phenomenon that makes history, like the total solar eclipse in 2017.

One predictable annual display is The Quadrantids Meteor Shower, and it is possibly the most underrated celestial event of the year. It peaks in early January with the same, if not greater, intensity as the Geminids or Perseids, with 60- 200 meteors per hour. Like all showers, the Quadrantids have a signature, which is incredible brightness in some of the streaking meteors. Unlike most showers, it does not originate from icy comet debris, rather the meteors shed from a rock object.

So why the hush hush with this shower? After all, it's fairly visible in the Northern Hemisphere, the radiant point (where the meteors appear to come from) is just under the Big Dipper making it very easy to find for all ages, and with up to 200 meteors per hour, one would think it would make headlines. There are a few possible reasons why it doesn't.

Meteor showers are named after the constellations where the meteors appear to radiate from. The Perseids are named after the Perseus constellation, Geminids are from the Gemini constellation and so on. There is no longer a constellation for the Quadrantids. It was originally named for the Quadrans Muralis constellation, which was dropped in an international astronomical 'reorganization' in 1922. The stars are still there, but they are now part of the Boötes constellation, near Draco and Ursa Major (Big Dipper). Although the original constellation went away, the meteor shower,



first documented in 1875, kept its name. The rock object the Quadrantids come from also doesn't have a flashy mythological name like Phaeton, which is where the Geminids come from. It's simply 2003 EH1, and it's thought to be a small, extinct comet.

Another possible reason that this shower isn't well known is that it peaks very sharply. Meteor showers have ideal viewing windows when we're more likely to see higher numbers of meteors, known as the 'peak'. It can last a day, it can go on for a couple of days as seen in the Perseids, but the Quadrantids peak over the course of only a few hours. Outside the peak window, we can expect to see several an hour, but not 200 and the meteors can be faint. Fortunately for 2019, there won't be any moonlight to contend with the Quadrantids.

South Platte Park is hosting a star party to celebrate this little-known yet fantastic shower on January 3 starting at 6pm. We'll have a campfire, refreshments and a cozy indoor space for warming up! Register at www.ssprd.org.

Snow Removal Procedures

Plowing and sanding operations will take place in four phases during a storm. The order in which streets are plowed in each phase is based on the following definitions of priority:

Priority 1: Main arterial streets that provide for high traffic volumes. **Priority 2:** Major subdivision collectors, school zones and school bus routes. **Priority 3:** Residential or other local roads that carry moderate to low traffic volumes. **Priority 4:** Cul-desacs or other dead-end roads carrying very low traffic volumes.

Phase I: Initial opening of all Priority 1 through 3 streets in that order. Severity of the storm may delay response time for Priority 3 streets due to the fact that initial opening of major arterial streets requires that multiple lanes be plowed in each direction.

Phase II: Plowing and sanding of problem roads having steep inclines, curves, bridges or overpasses. Widening of any Priority 1 through 3 streets deemed necessary. Repeat plowing of all streets initially opened as snow continues to accumulate.

Phase III: Removal of packed snow and ice on all Priority 1 through 3 streets where possible and deemed necessary as snowfall accumulation stops. Plowing and sanding operations on Priority 4 streets will take place as resource availability allows. It could be several days after the snowstorm has ended before Priority 4 streets are initially plowed. Intermittent sanding as necessary by road priority.

Phase IV: Storm event is over. Continuation of widening operations to improve safe travel and prepare for additional accumulation during subsequent storms.

SNOW REMOVAL CLARIFICATIONS

Driveways: Driveway approaches affected during Phases I, II, and III are the responsibility of the property owner or resident to clear.



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
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Mailboxes and Fences: Mailboxes, newspaper delivery boxes or fences installed alongside the traveled roadway are at the risk of the owner. If an operator strikes a mailbox or fence with a plow, the operator will report it and we will repair it as soon as possible. Mailboxes and fences damaged by snow load during normal plowing operations are not the responsibility of the County. If a mailbox is struck by a plow, it will be replaced with a standard rural mailbox. Postal regulations require residents to clear snow in front of mailboxes to allow for mail delivery.

Snow Pushed onto County Street or Right-of Way: The practice of pushing or throwing snow onto or across Jefferson County streets endangers the traveling public as well as county snowplow operators. Jefferson County residents as well as private contractors may receive a warning and/or summons for snow pushed onto County streets and rights-of-way from side-walks, driveways, parking lots, etc.
