### Things You Can Do to Make Your Home Safer

According to Reader's Digest, there are some simple things you can do to make your home safer.

These simple things can make a huge difference.

- Don't let your mail sit in the mailbox overnight or in your car. Take it in every day. Shred info that contains credit card offers.
- Make sure you arm your security system. Do it even when you leave for a short time. Most burglars can get into a home and out in just 10 minutes.
- Close blinds and curtains after dark. If someone is casing your house to see where your valuable electronics are-they can see when windows are open. It's also good for privacy reasons to close them so a potential burglar can't see that nobody is home. Leaving a light on also helps. Blocking someone's view might make them move on.
- Secure your sliding patio door with a metal or wood rod.
- Keep your garage door closed. Keeping the door open is asking for trouble from thieves.
- Display a warning sign or two. For example, a "beware of dogs" sign can deter thieves, even if you don't have a dog.
- Lock your windows and doors. This may seem simple, but often thieves get into a home because of unlocked doors and windows. Don't make it easy for them.
- Keep your yard free of tools and ladders. Keeping a ladder outside in your yard could make it easy for someone to break in on the second floor of your home.

### SWEET PUIATU

- Ingredients:
  - 3 to 4 medium sweet potatoes, peeled and sliced into 1/4-inch-thick rounds
- 1 tsp. maple syrup

1/2 c. pecan halves

- Kosher salt
- 1 (10-oz.) bag marshmallows
- 2 tbsp melted butter

### **Directions:**

Preheat oven to 400°. On a large baking sheet, toss sweet potatoes with melted butter and maple syrup and arrange in an even layer. Season with salt.

Bake until tender, flipping halfway through, about 20 minutes. Remove baking sheet from oven and switch oven to broil.

Top each sweet potato round with a marshmallow and broil until puffed and golden. Immediately top each marshmallow with a pecan half and serve.

# PARMESAN CRUSTED BRUSSEL SPROUTS Ingredients:

- 1 lb. Brussels sprouts, trimmed and halved
- 1/2 c. flour
- 2 Eggs, beaten
- 3/4 c. panko bread crumbs
- 1 c. freshly grated Parmesan
- 2 tbsp. olive oil
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/4 tsp. cayenne
- Caesar dressing, for dipping (optional)

#### **Directions:**

- 1 Preheat oven to 400. Grease a large baking sheet with nonstick cooking spray or olive oil.
- 2 Add flour to a medium shallow bowl and eggs to a separate medium shallow bowl. In a third shallow bowl, whisk together panko bread crumbs, Parmesan, olive oil, salt, garlic powder and cayenne.
- 3 Working in batches, toss brussels sprouts in the flour until fully coated then dunk in eggs. Dredge in panko mixture then place on baking sheet. Bake until golden and crispy, about 25 minutes.
- 4 Serve immediately with caesar dressing, if using.




