Fall Wildlife in Jefferson County

The black bears are active again and have been spotted in our neighborhood. Your newsletter editor had one in her yard on Kline Street in the north part of our neighborhood just this past week. Be mindful of your trash, lock your gates, bring in your bird feeders and don't leave your pets outside, unattended.

We also have some neighborhood friendly deer who have been grazing in the south part of our neighborhood. They appear to be living in the Ken Caryl sledding hill fieldand then they migrate to various yards.

We also have beavers that reside in the south ponds in Eagle Meadows park. You may have noticed the wire around the trees and the new tree they are slowly chopping

down. The beavers tend to block and dam the overflow of the pond, and that's when we see flooding and the water rising. It's a continual project for Foothills to come and clear out the pond.

Williamsburg 2 neighborhood is very fortunate to be able to be situated in the city, yet able to also experience a good deal of natural wildlife living or passing through. If you do spot a bear, coyotes or other wild animals, remember, they're wild and keep your distance. Make noise and back away. They are naturally afraid of humans and will typically flee.

Be aware if it's dawn, or dusk, because that's when wildlife are most active. Always have your camera at the ready-but remember to keep your distance! And if you're active on Facebook or Next Door, be sure to let your neighbors know if we have bear activity in the neighborhood!

The Melting Pot

Most of the waitstaff have a bizarre experience to share, like seeing reflections of faces in glass cases, hearing footsteps when no one was there, overhearing conversations between invisible people and seeing faucets turn themselves on. The building was once the Littleton police department and jail, and the ghastly rumor is that a prisoner, after killing an officer during an escape attempt, was gunned down before he got away. The Cruise Room

One of the oldest bars in Denver, the Oxford Hotel's glamorous bar has tons of history, including the legend of a postal worker who bellied up to the bar at Christmastime on his way to deliver presents in Central City. It didn't go well for this Santa, though: The body of the postal worker was found thawing the following spring, presents undelivered. Susan Wieser, general manager of The Cruise Room, said that around Christmastime, people have reported seeing a man in an old-timey postal uniform come in, order a beer, complain about the prices and then leave the beer untouched. The bathrooms, once the site of a barbershop, are believed to be haunted, too, with shadowy figures popping up in the mirrors and the smells of a barbershop wafting through the stalls. 1600 17th St., Denver, 303-628-5400; theoxfordhotel.com

Neon Baby (formerly The House of Mirrors, and a part of Lodo's Bar & Grill)

That building was one of Denver's first brothels. It's got murder mysteries, and it has a very vivid ghost history to go with it. One of the ladies who worked at The House of Mirrors, Ella Wellington, died in an upstairs room by a gunshot wound to the head. According to the tale, she had a politician in the room with her when she died. He said it was suicide, but him being a politician and all, some doubted the validity of the claim and thought that maybe he killed her. Over the years, employees reported unusual stuff happening upstairs, like the piano playing itself, the elevator moving between floors



without being summoned and a woman walking around when the building was supposedly empty. Bonner and the Rocky Mountain Paranormal Society did some investigations in the building, and during their first visit he said they came away with a recording of a conversation between two men who were definitely not there.

The Brown Palace

The Brown Palace has more than its fair share of ghost stories. The high-end hotel, which houses a few bars and restaurants, including Palace Arms, Ellyngton's and the Churchill Bar, however, doesn't want anything to do with them. A representative for the hotel said that they'd rather not promote this ghostly angle, but noted that The Brown does conduct private Enduring Spirits ghost tours. Bonner's favorite Brown Palace story is of a restaurant staff member cleaning up when he heard big band music coming from another room. "He went in and nobody was there," Bonner said. 
Meeting was held on September 22, 2020

hunting in the darker hours. Black and the night have long been symbols of evil due to the fears of our ancestors.

Many of the old Pagan religions also associated the black cat with witchcraft and evil. This carried through into Medieval times, where witches were said to take the form of a black cat at their will. During the witch trials, black cats were often burned at the stake alongside witches.

Many of these beliefs and myths have carried through to today, resulting in the slew of black cat imagery you will see this Halloween.

Black Cat Lore and Reality

While in our country the black cat is a symbol of evil and bad luck (don't let a black cat cross your path!), in many cultures it is actually good luck. In the British Islands, black cats are said to bring affluence to their homes, and in Japan they are a symbol of good luck as well. The ancient Egyptians even worshiped the black cat.

But alongside the myth and lore surrounding the black cat comes some very real truths.

Abuse of black cats – While the abuse and torture of black cats is not as rampant as the media would have us believe, stories of the sacrifice and other mutilation of these cats around Halloween abound. This probably doesn't occur with any great

frequency, but nevertheless it is probably smart to keep black pets close to home. Perhaps a more real concern is the adoption and then neglect of black cats intended for use as Halloween props and costume accessories. That's why some shelters won't adopt black cats in the weeks before Halloween.

Black cat syndrome – A very real risk of being a black cat is something called Black Cat/Dog Syndrome. This term refers to the fact that black pets are significantly less likely to be adopted from shelters and rescues than any other color. This may have something to do with the superstition surrounding black cats or the fact that black pets don't photograph or show facial expressions as well. It is true, though, that adoption facilities are often overflowing with black pets. Despite their ties with Halloween, black cats are no more mysterious or scary than any other cat. Keep this in mind when you go to adopt a new family member and don't forget to consider the black cats at the shelter on your next visit, maybe even on Black Cat Appreciation Day!
