HOT SPRINGS

What better way to warm up than with a soak in an all-natural, mineral-water hot spring? Here, you'll have 29 to choose from, each with its own charms. At Ouray Hot Springs Pool, unwind in the soothing waters with striking views of hulking snowcapped peaks. Clothing-optional Orvis Hot Springs in



Ridgway boasts massaging waterfalls and lithium-water springs said to enhance your feelings of relaxation. Meanwhile, Iron Mountain Hot Springs in Glenwood Springs has 16 pools of steaming natural mineral waters, all of which vary in temperature.



ICE SKATING

Enjoy some old-fashioned ice-skating fun at one of Colorado's many outdoor rinks. For an urban setting, visit the rinks in Fort Collins or Denver. Both are located in lively pedestrian areas and are surrounded by charming shops and cafes. SNOWMOBILING IN COLORADO

Combine the thrill of a high-speed ride with the beautiful scenery of the snowy alpine environment, and you'll discover why snowmobiling is so popular in Colorado. With miles and miles of trails in nearly every region of the state, you won't have trouble renting equipment and taking a ride. Some of the most popular areas include Grand Lake, Winter Park, Leadville, Buena Vista and South Fork.

ICE FISHING

Sometimes the best parts of ice fishing have nothing to do with fish at all. Winter anglers reap some of the state's most placid rewards: quiet landscapes, glimpses of early-morning light shimmering off a lake's frozen ripples and solitary animal prints tracking across the surface. You can go the basic route and just cut a hole, set up a chair and wait for a bite. Or for a more sophisticated approach, you can rent an ice-fishing cabin.

SLEDDING/TUBING

Bundle up the kids in hats and mittens and head for the hills — that's where you'll find plenty of sled- and tube-friendly terrain. It's hard for anyone not to emit a lighthearted giggle as you sail down the hill, catching a bit of air as you roll over gentle bumps. Try the hills at Vail, Keystone, Steamboat, Copper Mountain, Cuchara and Fraser. Lifts and tow ropes will lug your tube or sled to the top of the hills, giving you time for more runs.

HORSE-DRAWN SLEIGH RIDES

Warm, snuggle-ready blankets, crisp, winter air and the gentle jingle of bells tinkling to the rhythmic stride of strapping horses are hallmarks of Colorado sleigh rides. So are elegant dinners, local Colorado wines, convivial conversation, roaring fires and decadent desserts. Sleigh rides in Colorado are much more than circling around a track; they're fodder for vacation-defining moments and stories to share back home. Dude ranches, including those in Grand County and Steamboat Springs, are some of the best places to find fun sleigh rides.

SNOWSHOEING/CROSS-COUNTRY SKIING

Backcountry trails lead to fluffy-snow-covered valleys and peaceful stands of evergreen and aspen trees, where the only sounds you hear are chirping birds and your own heartbeat. Rocky Mountain National Park maintains dozens of these sorts of trails. Pick up a trail map from a ranger station or join a ranger-led group tour. The Brainard Lake area west of Boulder also offers an array of well-marked trails, as do the state's many ski towns. Experienced snowshoers and cross-country skiers can also make reservations for the state's extensive backcountry hut system, the 10th Mountain Division.

Jeffco Announces Important Snow Removal Updates

Jefferson County's Road and Bridge team is getting ready for the upcoming winter season, and the snow that comes with it. Due to a statewide shortage of truck drivers, Jefferson County Road and Bridge revised its Snow Removal Procedure for the upcoming 2021-22 winter season (see below for details). We appreciate your understanding as we work through this staffing shortage.

As we approach the time of year where snow begins to fall in Jeffco, we are encouraging community members to work from home whenever possible on days where snow storms affect the roads. Additionally, if you plan to visit a Jefferson County facility during snowy conditions, please visit www.jeffco.us prior to driving. There may be county closures in effect to help keep the roads open for plows (these alerts are shown on a banner at the top of all pages of the website). Many county services are available online and can be accessed on the Online Services web page.

Qualified individuals with a Class B Commercial Drivers License (CDL) and a minimum of one year of experience are encouraged to apply to join our team. Full details on snow removal in unincorporated Jefferson County can be found at www.jeffco.us/snow. Key highlights are included below.

Snow Removal Procedures for 2021-2022:

Plowing and application of traction materials will take place in four phases during a storm. The order in which streets are plowed in each phase is based on the following definitions of priority:

- Priority 1 Main arterial streets that provide for high traffic volumes.
- **Priority 2** Major subdivision collectors, school zones and school bus routes.
- **Priority 3** Residential or other local roads that carry moderate to low traffic volumes.
- **Priority 4** Cul-de-sacs or other dead-end roads carrying very low traffic volumes.

Plains Areas: If snow accumulations are six inches or less and melting IS forecasted to occur within 72 hours, snow plowing will not occur on Priority 3 and 4 streets. Please note that we do not remove packed snow and ice from residential streets that are passable by passenger cars.

Mountain Areas: Snow plowing and application of traction materials will NOT take place from 9 p.m. to 3 a.m. When snow depths are seriously impeding vehicle mobility and melting is NOT forecasted to occur within 72 hours, Priority 3 and 4 streets will be plowed. Please note that we do not remove packed snow and ice from residential streets that are passable by passenger cars.

Overview: Jeffco's Road and Bridge Division is responsible for snow removal on 2,900 lane miles of paved roads and 700 lane miles of gravel roads in the unincorporated areas of the county. One lane mile is a 10-foot wide section of road one mile long. State highways, private roads and newly constructed roads that have not been accepted by formal resolution of **the Board of County Commissioners are not included.**

Requests for Emergency Snow Removal: All requests for emergency snowplowing should go to the Jefferson County Sheriff's Dept. 303-277-0211. If the request is valid, they will notify the Road & Bridge Division, and we will respond as soon as possible.
