

Covid Updates for Jefferson County Schools

Thanks to the resolve of our entire community, we are pleased to share changes to COVID-related health protocols in Jeffco Public Schools facilities, **effective after Wednesday, June 9.**. These changes align with current public health guidelines.

- Temperature and health screenings are no longer required at the entrance of Jeffco Public Schools buildings. In lieu of screenings, we ask staff and families to utilize this home-screening review and guidance from the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE).
- Masks are no longer required at school, indoors or outdoors, for children age 11 and younger and for adults and students 12 and older who are fully vaccinated. "Fully vaccinated" is defined as having received both doses of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine plus two weeks, or having received the one-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine plus two weeks. Wearing a mask is optional and will be supported for those who wish to continue to wear masks in this group; however, masks are still required for individuals over the age of 12 who are not fully vaccinated.
- We encourage our community to consider receiving a vaccine. People
 who are fully vaccinated are not subject to quarantine should they be
 exposed to a COVID case in schools.
- If a student needs accommodations due to a health condition that prevents them from wearing a mask or receiving the vaccine, the student's parent/ guardian should reach out to the school principal or school nurse to initiate the accommodation process.
- If a staff member is unable to receive the COVID vaccine due to a
 health condition, please connect with your direct supervisor or Employee
 Relations for assistance with the accommodations process. Staff accommodations may result in customized protocols for others working with or
 learning from the staff member.
- Jeffco Public Schools is continuing to advocate with Jefferson County Public Health and CDPHE for removing current quarantine restrictions.
 The quarantine process will continue to follow CDPHE Guidance for Schools until new guidelines are determined by CDPHE.

It is wonderful to be able to share these changes in our protocols! We did this together. The hard work and dedication of our community has paid off, and we are pleased to return to more "normal" environments in our schools and district facilities. While there may be developments related to COVID over the summer, and we will continue to monitor the pandemic conditions within our community, there is a bright light shining on the coming school year.

Martian Climate Shifted Between Dry And Wet

The surface of Mars wasn't always dusty and dry. In fact, according to the Science Daily website, scientists believe that Mars shifted between wet and dry periods in its history until it dried up completely about 3 billion years ago.

Probes orbiting Mars have made detailed observations of the sedimentary beds under the red planet's surface. Examining clays deposited by lakes around the base of Mount Sharp, they've noticed evidence of dunes formed by wind during a long dry climate era. Higher up are signs of thin, brittle sedimentary beds from times of wetter conditions. This suggests that the Martian climate alternated on a large scale between dry conditions and periods of environments with rivers and lakes

The Curiosity rover will ascend Mount Sharp's foothills to drill into the sedimentary beds there, hoping to determine the cause of these major climate fluctuations.

August: What's In A Name?

August is named for the Roman emperor Augustus Caesar, grandnephew of Julius Caesar. When Augustus defeated Cleopatra and Mark Antony at the Battle of Actium in 30 B.C., he became emperor of Rome, and the Roman Senate quickly decided that since the month of July was named for Julius, their new emperor should also have his own month.

At the time, Sextillius (the sixth month of the year in the pre-Gregorian calendar) had only 30 days, so the Senate also decreed that the newly named August should be equal to July, and took a day from February to keep the calendar in balance.

Other emperors tried to get months named for them: May was called Claudius for a while, and April became Neronius, but the names didn't stick. Only Julius and Augustus Caesar's names apparently had the staying power to last 2,000 years.


Concerts in Clement Park

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One Last Barbecue? Keep It Safe

The end of summer frequently means one last barbecue—your final chance to enjoy warm weather before school starts for kids and work ramps up again for everyone else. You don't want to spoil the fun with an accident at the grill, though. Keep these important safety tips in mind for a good time:

- Read the instructions. Whether you're using a
 gas grill or one that burns charcoal, take some
 time to read the owner's manual before starting
 your fire. Be sure you're following the manufacturer's safety guidelines.
- Always grill outdoors. This may seem elementary, but not everyone understands the need for proper ventilation and basic fire precautions. Your garage, or a tent, isn't a safe location for a grill.
- Keep the grill stable. Check the surface you're placing your grill
 on. You don't want it to tip over unexpectedly. Also, take care to
 place it well away from the flow of people and pets, and especially
 children.
- Clean the grill first. Scrape off any grease or fat that can make a fire difficult to control.
- Stay close by. Never leave your grill alone while you're talking, getting food, or enjoying yourself.
- **Dispose of coals safely.** Once you're finished, douse the hot coals thoroughly, cover the grill, and wait at least 24 hours before emptying it. Never store coals in paper, wood, or plastic containers.

The Facts About Ransomware Attacks

Cybercriminals are increasingly demanding what's called "ransomware" to halt their attacks on company data around the world. A survey of 120 executives by Threatpost looked at its rise and implications.

Less than a third of respondents to the survey said they had suffered ransomware attacks. Of those that did, 17% were in the tech industry and 15% were in manufacturing, followed evenly by companies in finance, health care, and infrastructure.

However, 80% said they didn't pay the demanded ransom. Their main reason: They couldn't be sure paying the thieves would actually get them a decryption key. They were probably smart—80% of organizations that did pay the ransom were hit by a second attack from the same source, and a third said they suffered another attack by somebody else.

Of those companies that paid, five percent decided that giving into the demands was easier than dealing with the threatened business disruption, and two percent relied on cybersecurity insurance to cover the

Sixty-five percent of attacked companies suffered a revenue loss as a result, and about a quarter had to shut down; 53% reported that their brands and reputations suffered damage, and 32% reported losing top-level talent as a result.

Treat Sunburn Quickly

If you've been enjoying the great outdoors after a year of lockdown, chances are good you've been exposed to the sun, and that can cause sunburn if you're not careful. The Patience website shares these guidelines for treating sunburn effectively:

- Get out of the sun. If your skin starts to feel hot or sore, get into the shade as quickly as possible to avoid further damage.
- Cool affected skin. Use a cool, damp washcloth, or take a bath or shower. This may feel uncomfortable, but it will help minimize the damage.
- **Hydrate.** Drink lots of water. Sunburn is often associated with heatstroke and fatigue, so getting more fluids into your body helps heal you from the inside out.
- Take painkillers. Try over-the-counter pain relief and anti-inflammatory medications like ibuprofen or paracetamol to relieve soreness.

What Does That Mean? Origins Of Common Terms

The origins of some figures of speech are obvious—putting the cart before the horse, for instance. Others are a little more obscure. From Jeff Rovin's book *The Unbelievable Truth!* (Signet) here's a look at the explanations behind three common expressions:

- Pulling the wool over their eyes. In the 17th and 18th centuries, thieves and robbers would yank their victims' wool wigs down over their eyes so they couldn't see who was attacking them.
- Blackmail. In 16th-century England, mail meant "rent" or "tribute." Debts that had to be paid in silver were called "whitemail." A debt that could be paid in any other way—from livestock to property—was called "blackmail." Because blackmail did not have a set value, the person collecting the debt could extort any amount or anything they wished from the debtor.
- Red tape. For centuries, it was British custom to seal important documents with red wax and red tape. Cutting through it was the only way to get at the documents and read them.
