Best Rooftop/Patio Bars in Denver and Beyond

According to 5280 Magazine: As Coloradans, we love altitude. But why limit ourselves to 5,280 feet when we can be a mile high plus 27 floors up on a killer rooftop? With the weather becoming consistently warmer, it's time to head up—way up—to the best eating and drinking destinations around. These 12 rooftop bars and restaurants are tip-top spots at which to cheers a Rocky Mountain sunset.

54THIRTY

Starting with Denver's highest open-air rooftop bar, 54thirty is perched atop the Le Méridien hotel. The 20th floor bar, which is named for its altitude at 5,430 feet, is

popular (how could the city's highest al fresco rooftop bar not be?) so get there early or be ready to wait. The space offers oodles of sun during the day, fire pits on chilly nights, and Instagram cred, well, always.

Drink this: There may be no drink more appropriately named than the #Thatviewthough, a mix of vodka, chamomile tea syrup, lemon, and Denver Beer Co.'s Princess Yum Yum raspberry Kölsch.

GROW & GATHER

There's already a lot going on at Englewood's Grow & Gather: The former automotive shop now houses a hydroponic farm, urban garden, market, greenhouse, and a restaurant, The Feedery. But one of the best spots to enjoy all that hyper-locally grown produce is on the rooftop, at a table nestled between the greenhouse and grow bed retaining wall. That's a whole lot of greenery for an industrial stretch of Hampden Avenue. Note: Due to difficulty hiring, the rooftop is closed for the time being, but keep an eye out for a reopening later this summer.

Drink this: Grab an On the Fence kombucha or Middle State Coffee cortado for brunch, or one of the house cocktails made with the Family Jones spirits for happy hour.

TAP FOURTEEN

Don't worry beer geeks, there's a rooftop for you, too. Tap Fourteen offers 70 Colorado draft beers (and more than 50 Colorado-made whiskeys, because whiskey geeks need love, too) on the rooftop of Hayter's & Co. The south-facing beer garden is downright dripping in sunshine come summer, so bring the SPF.

Drink this: There are a lot of choices, but check out the Tap Fourteen exclusive, Platt Park Peach Guava Snowdance IPA.

PEAKS LOUNGE

If you're looking for a change in perspective, try the sky-high Peaks Lounge inside the Hyatt Regency at the Colorado Convention Center. A favorite of local sophisticates and out-of-towners alike, this 27th floor enclosed (but well-windowed) bar offers one of the best vantage points in town. Note: Peaks is currently closed but is expected to emerge from its COVID-19 cocoon at the end of May.

Drink this: End your night with city views and the 27th Floor, a decaf coffee liqueur, crème de cocoa, espresso, vodka, and cream cocktail.

THE WOODS

The Source Hotel's eighth-floor rooftop bar and restaurant, the Woods, is certainly one of our favorite spots to catch the unbeatable duo that is city skyline and mountain views. The wraparound terrace is our favorite perch, but even indoor tables share the views thanks to massive windowed garage doors. And when they're flung open on nice days, it's even better.

Drink this: Frosé all day.

AVANTI FOOD & BEVERAGE

On summer nights (and afternoons and, well, non-summer nights and afternoons), Avanti's rooftop is one of the hippest hangouts in town. And for good reason: Three bars make it so you can order another round without much delay, and the seven rotating food stalls serving everything from crispy crusted Naples-style pies (Gorlami) to sustainably sourced seafood (Del Mar by Rooted) are always top-notch.

Drink this: The seasonal margarita is always a hit; right now that's the Cactus Licker, a prickly pear marg with Tajin rim.

DEATH & CO.

It may not be the highest bar in town, but Death & Co.'s the Garden could be the most magical. The second-floor patio is filled with foliage and fairy lights, not to mention drinks with a more summery, tropical flair. Note: Death & Co.'s the Garden is reopening in June.

Drink this: You can't go wrong with any of the cocktails, but the nonalcoholic drinks—like the pineapple- and lime-infused Fantastic Planet—are especially thoughtfully crafted.

ALE HOUSE

Again, not the tallest rooftop in town, but what Ale House lacks in height, it makes up for in spicy bacon fat popcorn. The second-level LoHi bar, which can definitely attract a crowd, has great skyline views thanks to its positioning across I-25, and a food menu featuring everything from a peanut butter and jelly burger to a prime rib banh mi.

Environmental News

WEED BE GONE

It is without a doubt, weeds are frustrating! We all value the way our yards look and weeds can certainly act to diminish the appearance of your property. Unfortunately, there are products on the market today that make weed removal a bit simpler though sadly, are very dangerous to your health and the health of the environment.

Glyphosate is the key ingredient of the ever popular Roundup. New scientific studies link Roundup to a host of health risks such as cancer, miscarriages and disruption of human hormones (Web MD, Cancer Center, Herbicides and Your Health, April 26, 2021). Spraying the product on your weeds directly exposes you to the toxin as well as others by way of foot traffic, drift and ground water.

There are several alternatives to the use of herbicides including; natural acids (such as vinegar), herbicidal soap, iron-based herbicides, salt-based herbicides, natural phytotoxic oils (including, clove oil, Peppermint oil, pine oil and citronella oil) and corn gluten meal.

Please consider exploring these alternatives, many of which can be purchased nearby at Natural Grocers. It is also worth talking to your lawn treatment company about the chemicals they apply and/or contemplate switching to an earth friendly service. It would be nice to eliminate the need for the toxic warning flag left behind in your lawn.

Making the switch makes the environment much safer for all of us!

JEWELS OF THE SKY

It is that time of year again when we are blessed with the arrival of the hummingbirds! What a joy it is to hear them go humming by and watch as they stop for a drink from your feeder.

Hummingbirds are among the most fascinating of the bird species. They literally live on the edge as they must eat all day long just to survive! They consume about half their body weight in bugs and nectar, feeding every 10-15 minutes. To preserve the burn of calories, they go into a state of torpor at night, much like hibernation.

Given their ravenous appetites, it is easy to attract hummingbirds to your backyard. You can do this by setting up a feeder or planting their favorite flowers. If you plan to setup a feeder, make the sugar water mixture with ¼ cup refined sugar to every cup of water. Food coloring is unnecessary and can in fact be harmful. Be certain to change the syrup every 2-3 days to avoid harming the birds. Sugar water ferments rapidly to produce toxic alcohol, in addition to the risk of introducing fungus and bacteria to the hummingbird's very delicate system.

Feeders are a great 'fast food' for the hummingbirds though even better is a garden full of their favorite flowers. Some of those include Bee Balm, Lupine, Columbine, Penstemons, Butterfly Bush and Salvia. A diversity of plants is important and native plants will certainly do best in the harsh Colorado climate.

Enjoy these sweet little gems while they are here!

Fourth of July History and Other Interesting Facts

Many of us celebrate the Fourth of July every year with fireworks, barbecues, concerts and parades. Growing up, you may have heard that we celebrate Independence Day on July 4 because that's the day the Founding Fathers signed the Declaration of Independence, but that's not technically true! Although the Declaration was adopted on July 4, 1776, it wasn't signed by most people until a month later. Read on for some more interesting 4th of July facts and history and enjoy July 4, 2021!

4th of July History: On July 2, 1776, the Continental Congress voted in favor of declaring independence from Great Britain. The Declaration of Independence was officially adopted two days later, marked by the ringing of the Liberty Bell at Independence Hall in Philadelphia.

At the time, John Adams believed that July 2, not July 4, would be the date remembered by history.

"The Second Day of July 1776, will be the most memorable Epoch, in the History of America," Adams wrote in a letter to his wife on July 3 of that year. "I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival." Early July 4 traditions have not carried through to the present day. Some colonists celebrated the day by holding mock funerals for England's King George III, as a way of reinforcing America's victory over the British monarchy, according to History.com.

The Fourth of July was celebrated annually throughout the 18th and 19th centuries, and in 1870, Congress declared the day a federal holiday. But it wasn't until 1941 that the date became a paid federal holiday for federal employees.

Today, fireworks displays around the country echo Adams' call for "bonfires and illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other."

4th of July Facts

1. Americans typically eat 150 million hot dogs on Independence Day, "enough to stretch from D.C. to L.A. more than five times," according to the National Hot Dog and Sausage Council.
2. Three presidents have died on July 4: Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, and James Monroe.
3. Massachusetts became the first state to make the 4th of July an official state holiday in 1781.
4. The famed Macy's fireworks show in New York City uses more than 75,000 fireworks shells and costs about \$6 million.
5. Nathan's Famous Hot Dog Eating Contest is held annually on July 4. In 2018, champion Joey Chestnut ate 74 hot dogs with buns in just 10 minutes.
6. As of 2016, July 4 was the number one holiday for beer sales in the U.S., according to the National Beer Wholesalers Association.
7. Small towns in the U.S. typically spend between \$8,000 and \$15,000 on their fireworks displays.
8. About 16,000 July 4 fireworks displays happen around the country each year, according to the American Pyrotechnics Association.

Didn't Make The Team? Here's How To Help

- **Don't give up.** Remind your child that most people have experienced failure from time to time in their careers. They didn't give up, though. If your child really wants to pursue the activity, he or she can find a way.

Simple Tips For Saving Money

- **Go on a savings spree.** For one month, save a dollar amount on the day that corresponds to the date. On the first of the month, for example, save \$1; on the second, save \$2, and so on. By the end of the month you'll have saved up close to \$500—and gotten into the habit of saving.
