VAIL OKTOBERFEST

Date: Fri-Sun, September 9-11 & 16-18, 2022

Address: Lionshead Village and Vail Village, Vail

About: Celebration of Bavarian music, dancing, food, yodeling, and alpenhorn blowing, held over two weekends in Vail's Austrian-inspired village. Compete in Klement's Bratwurst Eating Contests, Keg Bowling, Stein Lifting, Oktoberfest Costume, and the Oktoberfest Fun Run. Paulaner Bier is enjoyed.

STEAMBOAT OKTOBERWEST

Dates: Sat, September 10, 2022

Address: Steamboat Springs

About: Over 40 brewers come to Steamboat's mountain village for this annual Octoberfest. Enjoy craft beer, live music, and a beef cook-off.

LOVELAND OKTOBERFEST

Date: Fri-Sat, September TBD 2022

Address: Grimm Brothers Brewhouse, Loveland

About: Free admission, food trucks, craft vendors, and family activities. Concert at Thunder Mountain Amphitheater.

PARKER OKTOBERFEST

Date: Fri-Sun, September TBD 2022

Address: O'Brien Park, Parker

About: 14th annual event with German music, dancers, Biergarten with three Paulaner beers, Miss Oktoberfest contest, and an obstacle course, bungee tramp & a slide for kids.

DENVER OKTOBERFEST

Date: Fri-Sun, September 16-18 & 23-25, 2022

Address: 21st Ave and Larimer St, Denver

About: Since 1969, Denver has been hosting its Oktoberfest, which now attracts over 350,000 fans. Maxim and USA Today claim it as the best Oktoberfest in the USA. Entertainment includes stein hoisting, keg bowling and brat eating contests, live music, as well as the 11th annual Long Dog Derby, which determines the city's fastest dachshunds.

CASTLE ROCK OKTOBERFEST

Date: Sat, September 17, 2022

Address: Wilcox Square and surrounding streets, Castle Rock

About: Free Oktoberfest, street fair, live music, food vendors, bounce houses, and demonstrations.

BRECKENRIDGE OKTOBERFEST

Date: Fri-Sun, September 23-25, 2022

Address: Main St, Breckenridge

About: Breck's Oktoberfest is one of the largest in the Rocky Mountains boasting German cuisine (two dozen food vendors), dancers, costumes, Oompah & polka music as well as Paulaner Bier. Activities include a 5k, keg tapping ceremony, and games for the kids. Please leave dogs at home.

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Colorful Autumn Drives in Colorado

SQUAW PASS

Squaw Pass is ideal for those Denverites short on time. You can begin in either Idaho Springs or Evergreen, via CO 103 and Squaw Pass Road, respectively.

The drive passes by Echo Lake and Mount Evans Byway (which usually closes in October). Evergreen and Idaho Springs both have nice downtowns with plenty of places to relax and eat during your trip.

Trip: Evergreen to Idaho Springs, 30 miles

GUANELLA PASS

Guanella Pass is full of autumn color on its hour long journey from I-70 to US 285. It peaks at 11,670 feet, where Mount Evans and Mount Bierstadt hover in the distance.

Historic Georgetown has numerous restaurants and is home to the Georgetown Loop Railroad, a memorable way to see the sights. In Grant, there's usually a BBQ stand open at the start of the pass, and Kenosha Cafe.

Trip: Georgetown to Grant, 22 miles

KENOSHA PASS

Kenosha pass offers a tremendous view of the valley. Continue west down the pass and you'll quickly reach Como, a tiny dot on the map. It's connected to Breckenridge via Boreas Pass (23 miles), another incredible fall trip.

Trip: US 285, 30 miles from Morrison

Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month

Ovarian cancer is a leading cause of cancer-related death in American women, largely because early ovarian cancer often has no symptoms. Age and a family history of the disease are the strongest risk factors. Screening for ovarian cancer is difficult, but pelvic imaging and blood tests are currently the best tests for diagnosing ovarian cancer.

Foothills Parks and Rec. Improvement Project

Since 2018, the District has been working hard to put the 2017 mill levy proceeds to excellent use by improving existing parks and facilities. The improvement projects proposed to be accomplished, starting in the year 2018, were outlined as part of the 2017 mill levy election.

In 2021, without raising taxes, proceeds from the 2020 mill levy continuation will support the Vision 2030 Master Plan, which features improvements recommended as part of a public process throughout the District that will focus on:

Maintaining, conserving and improving parks, open spaces, and natural areas throughout the District; Improving, connecting and extending recreational trails for walkers, hikers, and bikers; Providing and improving existing active recreation opportunities, programs and facilities for all residents, including seniors, families and children; Enhancing water conservation and energy efficiency by replacing or improving aging systems.

Clement Park – Sport Court Complex

- Current Conditions of Sport Court Complex: This park opened in 1987. Three of the four tennis courts and basketball court are closed and unusable due to severe cracking of asphalt surfacing.
- Recommendation: With the popularity and community requests for pickleball, construct 3 tennis courts and 10 pickleball courts. Remove batting cages and basketball court to make room for the pickleball courts.

- Improvements Description: Remove batting cages and basketball court. Replace current sport court area with three lighted tennis courts and 10 lighted pickleball courts. The location of the smaller tot playground will be shifted and positioned closer to the sport courts with new playground equipment. View the Conceptual Plan – concept plans are for planning purposes only and do not reflect actual finishes, colors or placement.
- Temporary User Impact: Sport court area will be closed during construction. Construction began in Fall 2021.
- Anticipated Completion: Summer 2022

Additional Background: The site now known as Clement Park was part of the Grant Family Ranch and was purchased from the Grant Family by Jefferson County Open Space for use as a park. In 1987, Jefferson County Open Space developed Clement Park with funds from the county-wide Open Space Tax. In 1989, the park was leased to Foothills Park & Recreation District for management purposes, and was deeded to Foothills in 2018. As part of the Clement Park Redevelopment Master Plan, several improvements have been completed during a multi-year process from 2016-2019. The District invested in renovating the batting cages located at Schaefer Athletic Complex that included offering 3-speed adjustable pitching machines, ranging from 40 – 70 MPH, as well as a choice of Baseball, Softball and Softball slow-pitch.
